Welcome to our Spring 2012 edition of Trust Talk. Easter Sunday this year falls on the 8th April which should mean reasonably good weather for our annual Pilgrimage to Lourdes.

As we go to press all the flights have been booked for the 1,100 guests and helpers that will fly out on Easter Sunday from Belfast, Dublin, Cork and Shannon. We also have a flight booked to take the 120 cyclists to Dinard in Northern France for the start of their 7 day / 870km cycle to Lourdes arriving on Good Friday the 6th April. May I wish them and all the support team every success and a strong tail wind for their long cycle. News from around the Regions



IHCPT RETREAT, 2011

The Trust Retreat was held in Kilcuan on Saturday 19th November 2011. Those attending included members who travelled from the south east, western and north western regions. They gathered from early morning to join in a wonderful peaceful day of reflection and prayer lead by Fr. Frank Murray from Ferbane, Co. Offaly. Trust Chaplain, Fr. Michael McGrath was on hand to welcome everyone and introduce the day's programme. The Oratory in Kilcuan was prepared in advance by Fr. Frank, who had arranged icons and symbols close to the altar. Everyone was immediately put at ease by Fr. Frank's relaxed and easy introduction. This set the tone for a deeply spiritual and personal experience through interaction and personal time guided by Fr. Frank.

The day was further enhanced by unexpected bright and fine November weather as winter sunshine bathed the Oratory. Everybody took advantage of the fine weather as people walked in the grounds during breaks and took time to reflect in private or with friend. Fr Frank's use of the icons and symbols unfolded a spiritual journey that gave the Retreat day depth and meaning that was shared by everyone there.

This Easter will be the 40th consecutive year that Fr Hugh O'Byrne, past Trustee and Trust Chaplain, from the South East Region will have travelled with the Trust and Hosanna House.

Boly Mill


The Boly Mill, along the rue Bernadette Soubirous, was the house where Ste. Bernadette was born on the 7th January 1844. At that time it was both family home and family business to the Soubirous. The area was known as Boly and Bernadette's father Francois was the miller. Before her first birthday her mother Louise suffered an injury while pregnant with her second child and Bernadette was sent to Bartrès to be looked after, where she lived for 11 months. The family lived at the Boly Mill until 1854, when famine hit that part of France and through the generosity of Francois, always looking after the very poor, giving them flour without payment, business failed and they could no longer afford the rent. The mill house is now a museum many artefacts are preserved and is well worth a visit.

Only some parts are accessible to wheelchairs.



Le Cachot

When they left the Boly Mill, the family moved from boarding house to boarding house over the next couple of years. Failing to meet their meagre rent in May 1856, the family was left homeless. A cousin took pity on them and allowed them stay in an abandoned prison cell - "Le Cachot" (the cell) was no more than 16 metres square. While the family remained here in extreme poverty for the next few years, Bernadette spent some time back in Bartrès, looking after sheep and also as a babysitter, minding the child of Marie Laguës. In January 20th, 1858, Bernadette returned to live in the misery and squalor of the Cachot and it was from here, some 3 weeks later that she went to the river at the Grotto of Massabielle to collect firewood, where she saw her first apparition on the 11th February 1858. Le Cachot can be visited today and is located on the rue des Petits Fossét and *is wheelchair accessible.*



Maison Paternelle de Ste. Bernadette

The Maison Paternelle is near to the Boly Mill and belonged to the Mayor of Lourdes. In 1863 Father Peyramale rented it out to the Soubirous family and eventually gave it to them in 1867 while Ste. Bernadette was receiving an education at the Hospice where she was living since 1860. Bernadette's mother dies in 1866 followed by her father in 1871. *It is not very wheelchair accessible.*



Parish Church – St. Pierre's

Situated in the upper town of Lourdes is the Parish Church, built between 1875 and 1903, it retains many reminders of the old Parish Church of St. Peter that was destroyed. On the right hand side of the transept, is the original Baptismal Font (saved from the old church) where Bernadette was baptised on 9th January 1844. In the crypt is the tomb of Abbé Peyramale who was parish priest of Lourdes at the time of the apparitions. The church is always worth a visit and is wheelchair accessible.

The Lagües House & Sheepfold at Bartrès

This small village set in the beautiful foothills of the Pyrenees and only 4 kilometres from Lourdes had an important role in the life of Ste. Bernadette. In November 1844 Saint Bernadette was sent there to be wet-nursed by Marie Lagües where she lived for 11 months before returning to her mother in Lourdes. 13 years later she was to return again to the home of Marie Lagües, this time as a farmhand because Bernadette was one mouth too many to feed at her own home where hunger was a daily reality. Her days were so full working on the farm, looking after the children of her foster-mother and looking after the lambs in the sheepfold, that Ste. Bernadette did not have the time to learn her catechism with the Parish Priest of Bartrès. In the evening, Marie Lagües would teach her the Catholic Faith but she had difficulty in retaining her lessons to the annoyance of her former wet-nurse. Finally, on 21st January 1858 Bernadette returned to Lourdes to prepare for her First Communion.



The main parts of the house are accessible to wheelchairs.

The Sheepfold where Bernadette looked after the sheep is situated on the hill overlooking the village of Bartrès and is only a short walk for the more able bodied as *it is not accessible for wheelchairs.*

The Parish Church in Bartrès where Ste Bernadette loved to pray is also well worth a visit and *is accessible to wheelchairs.*



The City of the Poor - Cité Saint-Pierre

The City of the Poor, at the foot of Beout Mountain was created in 1955 by Mgr. Rodhain, founder of the Secours Catholique, in order to welcome pilgrims with little or no financial resources, to enable them come on pilgrimage to Lourdes. Thousands of individuals and families use the facilities every year. It can accommodate up to 500 people in this beautiful setting. The city is managed by the Secours Catholique and up to 1000 volunteers give 3 weeks of their time each year to work there. It is a property of several hectares situated at Béout, only 15 minutes' walk from the Grotto. It is well worth an afternoon's visit where groups can take a guided tour of the facilities, play games in the many fields and have picnics. *It is wheelchair accessible* and wheelchair friendly mini busses leave every 15 minutes from just outside St Joseph's Gate. Many groups walk the downhill journey home.



Hosanna House

Hosanna House is situated in the village of Bartrès some three kilometres from the town of Lourdes, a hostel, opened by HCPT in 1975. It caters for young people and adults with special needs, giving them the opportunity to experience a pilgrimage holiday in a safe environment. Set in beautiful gardens, with spectacular views of the Pyrenees it is a place well worth a visit by groups, on their way to Bartrès. Two groups of approximately 40 pilgrims each travel to Hosanna House with the Irish Pilgrimage Trust each June, enjoying a week's holiday pilgrimage with Our Lady.

It is fully wheelchair accessible.

I am taking this opportunity once again to write to you on behalf of the Trust.

The Trust thankfully is strong and vibrant and continuing to grow and prosper. We have more people than ever wishing to travel to Lourdes with us at Easter time and Hosanna House in June, both carers and guests. Our house at Kilcuan is a great facility for both the Trust and other caring organisations providing a great holiday spot for our guests and respite for their families and carers. Our new holiday home "Cois Cuain" located at Kilrane in Co. Wexford, near Rosslare Harbour has been very successful since opening last year. This house is available to groups of up to 17 people or families for holidays. All these developments can be reviewed on www.irishpilgrimagestrust.com

One of our greatest challenges each year is the dreaded fundraising and in the current times, we believe that this is becoming more difficult. Also our costs of getting to Lourdes are increasing faster due to increases in fuel prices. Traditionally, most of the fundraising as you know has been done by the groups' carers and this is now more difficult than ever. In an effort to share this responsibility, we are asking the wider Trust Family to get involved. This can be done either passively or actively. We attach a standing order form for anyone who might wish to make a donation monthly or annually. Any annual payment of over €250 is eligible for a tax refund to The Irish Pilgrimage Trust. The Countdown has started

It could be a foggy Sunday morning in Kilkenny, or a windy Saturday in Derry—but if you keep your eyes peeled, you are sure to see one of our cyclists in their distinctive livery training for Cycle 2012. In excess of 130 cyclists have signed up to undertake the challenge this year.



The cycle group departs from Shannon at 7 am on Sat. March 31st. and start cycling as soon as they disembark in Dinard. Seven days, and a thousand kilometres later they will climb the Pyrenees to arrive in Lourdes on Good Friday afternoon. Even though the start and finish points are the same as previously, there is a completely new and more challenging route.

From Dinard, the cyclists veer more in-land than previously and will pass through Rennes, Angers, Poitiers, An-gouleme, Bordeaux and Mont-de-Marsan. These pictures give some flavour of the cycle—there is certainly great fun and camaraderie, and this is what is remembered. It is not easy to show the blisters, fatigue and pain—fortunately quickly forgotten!

Rise and Shine



On Saturday January 7th 2012 musicians and singers of the Trust, together with the Kiltullagh Community Choir, gathered in the oratory in Kilcuan to record "Rise and Shine", a new musical CD of 14 tracks of our favourite songs and hymns from our Lourdes liturgies.

More than 40 people gathered under the musical direction of Damian McNicholl to capture some of the musical atmosphere of the Easter pilgrimage. The first song recorded on the day was *Sing it in the Valleys* and as I listened from outside I was genuinely transported back to St. Bernadette's basilica in Lourdes. The singers and musicians put their hearts into the whole process and it was a very special feeling to be there and relive the magic of Lourdes.

The Kiltullagh Community Choir who travelled to Lourdes with us as part of our 40th Anniversary Celebrations last year, brought talent and energy to the production. Director Dr. Michael McGloin and musician's Ciarán Cannon on keyboard and Oisín Cannon on percussion, led the singing. Soloists from Kiltullagh who included Áine Morgan, Brenda Earls, Finola Lawless, Melissa Lawless and Ciarán Cannon, enriched the performance enormously. Heartfelt thanks to all from Kiltullagh who gave up their day to record this CD.

Group 751, youth group from Mayo under the leadership of Ann Marie Lardner joined Kiltullagh and added greatly to the day. Soloist Elaine

Madden's rendition of *You Raise Me Up* raised all of us up. Marese O'Hora showed her musical prowess in playing the harp and the flute at different times during the production. Soloists, Clare Kelly, John Porteous and Damian McNicholl all of whom are familiar voices on the altar of St Bernadette's for the Tuesday morning Mass, travelled long distances to share their talents with us.



One very important aspect of this production was the co-operation and willingness to participate, from all those involved. No one even hesitated in saying yes to the invitation to take part in this project. We are delighted with the finished CD and we will officially launch it at our pre pilgrimage meeting in March. Copies of the CD will be available at €10 each in the Base, our shop in Lourdes during Easter week, from our website, through our regions and from the office in Kilcuan. We hope you bring home with you from Lourdes this year; the music and spirit of the pilgrimage in this CD; a nice souvenir for yourself; or a gift for someone who has travelled on our pilgrimage in the past who would love this opportunity to recapture some of the memories of Lourdes.

Some thoughts from Catriona, Group 61

When I was in 5th year in school, a volunteer from the Trust came to tell us about the pilgrimage, hoping to find some students interested in taking part. While I may have gone to the talk just trying to miss some class, I was quickly won over by the idea of volunteering. Whether it was the rainbow coloured jerseys, the catchy songs or just seeing the big grins on every face in the DVD, I knew this was the place for me! That Easter, I donned the blue jersey of Group 64, tipped my white cowboy hat to my parents in farewell and set off into the unknown. I joined a different group, Group 61, in my third year with the Trust (purple is more my colour), but regardless of the colour jersey everyone in Lourdes is there for the same reason: to give some young people (and the volunteers!) a brilliant holiday!

One of my favourite masses of the week is the Irish Mass. It's easier to compare this to an All-Ireland Football Final than a mass, in fact one year while I was painting everyone's face for the mass, another volunteer asked had I misheard and thought we were going to an Irish match not mass! This mass is for every group from Ireland, a few American groups and a group from Croatia, all in different coloured jerseys, funny hats, faces painted, Irish flags flying and shamrock shaped sunglasses. It has all the tripping's of a normal mass, but there is so much more! Singing Mama Mia during the homily, clapping loudly to the hymns, dancing in the aisles and starting a conga line, is considered a normal occurrence here!

Some of the young people are asked to get up in front of all these groups and say a prayer and even though we've only been in Lourdes 2 days, you can already see a difference in these children. Leaving their families in the airport, they can be quiet, nervous, anxious and barely look you in the eye, but pretty soon they come out of their shell and are all keen to get up on the altar and say their bit! At the end of the Irish Mass this year, all of the young people in Group 61 got up on the altar, leading the crowd in 'Rise and Shine' and I think the huge grins on all of their faces made my week then and there!

There is so much to see and do in Lourdes - walking up to the castle, visiting Bernadette's home, partaking in the beautiful candle-light procession or taking a trip up to the snow capped mountains in Gavarnie. However, I think some of our best moments are when we're on the Prairie. This large green grassy area behind the Grotto is

where you'll find us whenever the sun is out! We'll play a friendly game of football, a competitive game of rounders or even just make daisy chains! Many of the places that we can visit are places that Bernadette knew when she was alive: the parish church where she was baptised, the Bolly Mill where she and her family lived and the cachot that provided them with shelter during difficult economic times are all within easy walking distance.

At some point during the week we get to visit Bartres. This is a small village in the hills a few kilometres from Lourdes, where Bernadette lived with her uncle and cared for the sheep in the hills.

One of the best experiences in Lourdes is a trip to the Shrine's Baths. Our Lady invited Bernadette to ask people to come and pray at this place. Bernadette discovered a spring and for over a century people have come to Lourdes to drink the water. Many people actually bathe in the water reminding themselves of baptism and forgiveness of sins. No matter how many people explain it and describe it and tell you what to expect, it's really one of those things you just have to experience for yourself.

One evening during the week, the Trust members partake in the Marian Candle-light Procession. We all walk as one, in a slow steady rhythm, holding candles aloft and softly murmuring the words of the Hail Mary. It is spectacular to see. A river of candle-light flows and ebbs through the Grotto. Thousands of people from different backgrounds coming together with one belief and one hope.
